

Westtown Township Sewer Survey Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ)

1) Why is it important that I answer the survey?

Westtown Township is at the beginning of a 10-15 year project to install public sewers throughout the township. In order to do that most effectively we must first identify where there is the greatest need for public sewers. Based on need and location we will phase the installation of sewers. The only way we can accurately assess the residents and areas in greatest need is through the township wide survey. Your participation is essential.

2) Will someone come out and inspect my septic system? If so, will it cost me money?

Possibly...but you will be notified in advance. As a way to verify the statistical validity of the survey we will identify a random sample of homes and those properties' septic systems will be inspected. These inspections will be done entirely at the expense of Westtown Township. A professor at West Chester University has been hired by the township to analyze the survey results, create the random sample for inspections, and provide the township with meaningful results.

3) Will Westtown Township share the information I provide with ANYONE else?

Absolutely not! This information is being collected for one reason...to enable us to determine the most effective way to install sewers throughout the township. No person or organization will have access to this information except for the sole purpose of this project.

5) Will I ever find out the results of the Township-wide survey? If so, how?

Yes, the Board of Supervisors will hold public meetings to present the findings from the survey and then residents will be invited to future public meetings as we discuss the best methods to implement our sewer plan. The township has been divided into 5 "sectors" and each sector will be evaluated independently as to the best sewer implementation for that area, and the time phasing. Resident participation in that process will be encouraged.
