



TOWNSHIP MANAGER'S REPORT

BRIDGES

Westtown Township has had a history of bridge problems. In 2000 the Oakbourne Road bridge washed out. At about the same time, what was known as the "Singing" bridge on Route 926 and the bridge on Westtown Road were out of commission.

Last September, the heavy storms washed out the Oakbourne bridge again. At that time it was necessary to close the road as continued traffic over the bridge would have resulted in its collapse. At the same time, the South New Street bridge showed signs of strain. Although it was not seriously compromised and it was not necessary to close that bridge, it was determined that some repairs would be required so that the bridge did not become inoperable.

Repair of the Oakbourne bridge began early in June. The Goose Creek flooding had created a large void behind the east abutment of the bridge and a smaller void on the western end. Repairs involved pumping concrete into these voids to restore the integrity of the structure. As this newsletter goes to the printer, work is complete on the eastern end, and it is expected that the bridge will re-open before the target date of July 1st.

As part of the road maintenance program for 2011, Westtown is looking to undertake the reinforcement of the New Street Bridge. Over the years, occasional flooding of Radley Run has caused the ground on which the bridge abutment sits to wash away. While this has not caused an immediate threat to the integrity of the bridge itself, it has created a condition which, if unchecked, will cause an eventual bridge collapse. The Board of Supervisors decided that, even though budgets are tight, it would be prudent make the necessary repairs before the situation becomes worse.

The work to be done will involve establishing a firmer foundation for both the south and north abutments. In addition, rock will be placed in the area of the abutments in an effort to mitigate the scouring effects of the rushing water. It is not expected that the bridge will be closed except for short periods during the repair efforts.

Vehicle Theft Tips

Recently, the Westtown-East Goshen Regional Police Department has noticed an increase in the number of incidents where items are stolen out of parked vehicles. Oftentimes these crimes are crimes of opportunity and as such can be prevented and the criminals can be deterred through simple crime prevention methods. In order to reduce the likelihood of becoming a victim of theft the police department would like to suggest the following tips:

1. Lock your vehicle when you park it.
2. Don't leave items of value in plain sight inside your vehicle. Preferably remove these items and take them with you when you park your car. If this is not possi-

ble, attempt to place the items in an inconspicuous location such as under the seat, in the trunk, or in the glove box. This includes things that might suggest valuable items being in your vehicle such as a windshield mounted GPS holder even if the GPS unit is not in it.

3. If your vehicle is to be parked overnight try to park in an area with an unobstructed view (i.e. not right next to bushes, in a well lit area, consider using motion lights to help deter anyone from approaching your car under the cover of darkness).

4. Lastly, please report any suspicious activity that you observe by calling 911.

REMINDERS FROM THE CODE ENFORCEMENT DEPARTMENT

Shrubs in Right of Way

With all the rainfall in the spring of this year the shrubbery in Westtown is looking great. Flowers are in bloom and the grass seems to need mowing more than once a week. Looking especially healthy are the foundation shrubs and the shrubs and plants that are growing at the front of properties with road frontage. Some of the properties with roadside plantings are experiencing such growth that the shrubs overhang the roadbed creating a hazard for pedestrians and vehicles alike.

The Westtown Township Zoning Ordinance specifies what can be planted in the right-of-way, that is the area of the property close to the curb or paved road in the front of properties. Generally, the smaller roads in the Township have a right of way that extends approximately 25 feet from the centerline of the road and back onto the property. Article 170-1507 (C) Landscaping and site design states:

“There shall be no plantings, ground cover or other objects (such as fences) placed within the road right-of way above 18 inches in height.”

All property owners are encouraged to examine the right-of-way at the front of their property to evaluate the plantings that negatively impact the right-of way. Please make sure to trim back plantings to the maximum 18 inch height limit and to remove plantings that overhang the roadway.

At any future time work that may be required by a public utility or Township road crews could cause damage or the removal of plantings in the right –of-way. The Township and contractors working for the Township are not obligated to replace or restore plantings and other objects removed from the right-of-way during work on the right-of-way.



Street Addresses

All principal buildings in the Township are required to have street address numbers. This is a safety issue. Use of the correct street address, properly displayed, enables emergency responders to quickly and accurately locate your property in an emergency situation.

The designated street number, assigned by the Township address coordinator, must be posted on each building, dwelling unit or commercial or business establishment or its associated mailbox in accordance with the following specifications and regulations:

- A If the principal building is serviced by a mailbox mounted at the end of the access drive, the designated street address number shall be posted on both sides of the box or post.
- B If the street address number is not visible as described in Subsection A above and there is no mailbox located at the access drive, the street address number must be posted on a marker placed at the driveway entrance.
- C If an access drive serves more than one principal building the

street address numbers shall be posted at the end of the drive and auxiliary numbers shall be posted to identify the main entrance to each structure and/or dwelling unit.

- D The street numbers shall be Arabic in design, shall have a minimum height of three inches and shall be mounted in secure fashion in accordance with the appropriate specifications in Subsection A, B, or C above.
- E The numbers shall be so designed as to be readily legible and visible during daylight hours by a person possessing normal vision from the center lines of the facing street, and shall be placed so that trees, shrubs and other obstructions do not block the line of sight of the numbers from the center of the facing street to any appreciable degree.

Parking on Residential Properties

The Township Zoning Ordinance restricts parking of commercial vehicles on residential properties - only one small truck is permitted. The Ordinance also bans parking of trailers and RVs in the front yard.

From the Emergency Management Coordinator

The Special Needs Registry

Westtown Township is participating in the Pennsylvania Emergency Management Agency Special Needs Registry program. It's an Internet based system which allows individuals who may need some additional notification, attention or assistance during an emergency situation. It is designed to allow you to submit



information for yourself, or as a caregiver for someone else. Once you log on at <https://specialneedspa.org>, you will be asked to create a User name and password to insure the security of your data, then you are presented a short form to fill out, describing what needs you, or the person you are filing for, may require. In an emergency, your information can be viewed by Chester County Emergency Management personnel and the Westtown Emergency Management Coordinator, who will be able to make sure you are notified of the emergency and provided the assistance you need. If you may need some extra help during an emergency situation, from power failure to evacuation, please take a few minutes and register on this system.

Westtown Evacuation/Comfort Center

In a full-scale emergency situation that makes it impossible for us to

stay in our homes or apartments, Emergency Management and the American Red Cross will open Mass Care Shelters, where you will be provided food and shelter until it's safe to return home. When things are not quite so bad, if for instance a short-term evacuation is necessary, or our homes are OK but uncomfortable (very hot, very cold, no power, and things like that), Westtown Township will open an Evacuation/Comfort Center. This center will be a place to go to get a cup of coffee or cold drink, warm up or cool off, charge your cell phone, and get an update on the situation. You will be notified by email and a message will be placed on the Township Web Site and answering machine that a center is being opened and where it will be. The first choice will be the Westtown Township Building, but other sites may be utilized based on the situation. This center will be staffed by members of the Westtown Emergency Management Team.

The Township will sincerely appreciate your cooperation in seeing that your payments are received in a timely manner.

Many of our residents choose to pay these bills using their banks payment services. Unfortunately, this does not always result in the payments being received by the due date printed on the bill. If you pay your bills using your banks bill payment service, make sure you instruct the bank to send the check at least 5 days before the due date.

All accounts which are not paid in full by the due date are subject to late payment penalties.

RECYCLING AND TRASH INFORMATION

YARD WASTE/LEAF COLLECTIONS

The following are the collection dates for the remainder of the year: All Saturdays. July 16 and August 20th – Dumpster at behind Police Office 9:00Am – 1:00Pm; Curb side September 24th, October 22nd, November 5th, November 19th, and December 10th. Make sure all yard waste is curbside by 7:00Am – place in biodegradable bags, or a container that may be dumped – **NO PLASTIC Bags. Limbs must be cut to 3 feet in length and tied.**

Holiday Pickup. The Following are the official holidays for A. J. Blosenski when your trash will not be collected: New Years Day, Memorial Day, 4th of July, Labor Day, Thanksgiving and Christmas. Your makeup days are: **Monday pickup** your trash and recycling will be collected the **Saturday before** the holiday. **Thursday pickup** your trash and recycling will be collected the **Saturday after** the holiday.

LEAVE YOUR GRASS CLIPPINGS AS YOU MOW. Clippings provide nutrition of your lawn. They are comprised of water, organic matter, nitrogen, and a small amount of phosphorus – all things your grass needs. Because clipping supply up to 50% of a lawn’s nitrogen needs over the season, you will not need as much fertilizer. Clippings from regular mowing will NOT cause thatch build up and will not hurt the grass.

PLEASE DO NOT DUMP YARD WASTE CLIPPINS, BRANCHES OR LEAVES IN THE STREET WHERE IT CAN WASH INTO STORM DRAINS, OR IN PARKS, ALONG STREAMS, OR PILED AT THE BASE OF TREES.

How to Prepare Items for Recycling
Glass—Green, Brown & Clear: Bottles or Jars only. Rinse Clean. Remove lids and rings. Labels may be left on. <i>NO plate glass, ceramics, drinking glasses, etc.</i>
Plastic: Must be marked with #1 through #7 inside triangle on bottom. Rinse clean. Remove lids and discard. Labels may be left on. <i>NO unmarked containers or containers marked with other than #1 through #7 inside the triangle on bottom.</i> No antifreeze or motor oil containers.
Aluminum Beverage Cans: Rinse clean. Cans may be flattened. No bottle or jar lids, no pie plates or aluminum foil. <i>No other aluminum items.</i>
Bi-Metal Cans: Rinse clean. Cans may be flattened. Examples include pet food cans, soup cans, vegetable cans. <i>NO cans with plastic parts. NO paint or aerosol cans.</i>
Newspaper, Magazines, Phone Books, Junk Mail, small cardboard boxes (cereal, crackers, etc) & Office Paper: Combine in paper bag or bundle and tie.
Cardboard Boxes: Must be cut in <u>three foot squares</u> , tied and placed next to the recycling bin. This is necessary because of the compacting system of the recycling truck. Unfortunately if the cardboard is not prepared this way it will be taken with the regular trash. Cereal boxes and similar cardboard items may be combined with newspaper.
